The following examples are based on the *MLA Handbook for Writers of Research Papers* (7th Ed.). They are presented as a guide. If you do not see the format you need, consult the manual or use the MLA format link under “Writing/Research” on the CMS Library Media Center web page.

PRINT RESOURCES	WORKS CITED FORMAT
Book – single author	Frye, Northrop. <u>Anatomy of Criticism: Four Essays</u> . New York: Atheneum, 1997. Print.
Book – single editor	Gilmore, Jack, ed. <u>America During World War I</u> . New York.: Chelsea, 2009. Print.
Book – more than 1 author	Birchfield, Martha and Wallis D. Hoffis. <u>The Plain Language of War</u> . Lincolnnton, NE: 2005. Print.
Encyclopedia article	Evert, Chris. “World War I.” <u>The World Book Encyclopedia</u> . 1996 ed. Print.
Article from a magazine	Monk, Patricia. “Family Life at the Homefront.” <u>Cobblestone</u> . 20 Nov. 2004: Print.
Article in a multi-volume series	Miller, Ruth. “War to End All Wars.” <u>Encyclopedia of American History</u> . Ed. Joel Myerson. Vol. 1 Pittsburg: Chelsea, 2004. 33-74. Print.

BOOK entries consist of the following information (if available):

- Author (inverted) OR editor OR compiler OR translator
- Title (italicized or underlined)
- Edition
- Number of the volume(s)
- Series name
- Place of publication
- Name of publisher
- Date of publication
- Medium (ie. Print)

MAGAZINE/JOURNAL/ARTICLE entries consist of the following information (if available):

- Author (inverted)
- Title of article (in quotation marks)
- Name of the periodical (italicized or underlined)
- Series number or name
- Volume number
- Issue number
- Date of publication (in parentheses)
- Page numbers

<p>Article in reference database (Discovery Streaming, eLibrary, etc.) – only full-text articles are allowed! Citations for electronic resources include the following information (if available):

- Author and/or editor names(s)
- Article name in quotation marks
- Title of the Website, project or book in italics
- Any version numbers available, including revisions, posting dates, volumes, or issue numbers
- Publisher information, including the publisher name and publishing date
- Page numbers
- Date you accessed the material
- URL (if your teacher required this!)

REMINDERS:

- double-space the cards
- indent the second and each succeeding line of each entry
- pay close attention to punctuation, underlining, etc.

-- CREATING A WORKS CITED PAGE --

The works cited page is included as the last page of your paper and is simply an alphabetical listing of the resources you used to write the paper. Just remember to double space the entire page and indent the second and each succeeding line of each entry.
